# MINUTES OF THE WEEDERS MEETING

# DECEMBER 9TH, 2014 THE JEANES-KARABOT LIBRARY

## **Community Affairs**

**Strawberry Mansion** 

Patricia Doolittle reported for herself and Lynn Gibbons about the extremely creative use their Committee had made of common household recyclable materials to decorate Strawberry's Entrance Hall and Lewis Parlor for the Christmas tours. The items included light bulbs, tin cans, bottle caps, corks, and tea bags! The results were "spectacular," and Patricia commended Beth Kowalski, the director of Strawberry, as the creative energy behind the effort. There were three workshops, after which Strawberry provided the participants with lunch.

#### **Ronald McDonald House**

Wendy Bailey chaired a wonderful effort to create floral arrangements for Ronald McDonald House at St. Christopher's, and said that photos of the decorations can be seen on the website.

**Magnolia Tribute Garden** This is a project of the PCGCA, and members from Philadelphia-area clubs are asked for help for fall and spring clean-ups. Wendy Bailey, Ellie Penniman, and Marilyn Sprague assisted with the fall event, and reported on the wonderful experience.

#### Gazebo Garden of the Ludington Garden

Cheryl said that the garden was in terrific shape, with a mountain of debris to prove it. She urged anybody interested to come help out there on Mondays.

#### **Strafford Station**

Alice Doering encouraged members to join in at Strafford. This year they have planted several new shrubs and a couple of trees. They placed large Christmas wreathes on the overpass (carefully avoiding annihilation by Amtrak), and will use the leftover greens from this meeting to decorate the pots at the station.

#### Conservation

Nancy Evans reported on the Committee's Nov. 12th trip to the Covanta Plymouth Renewable Energy trash-to-steam operation, near Plymouth Meeting. The firm's environmental engineer, Paul Bunn, spoke with unshakable conviction about the remarkable benefits of his process. He acknowledged the general unpopularity of such operations with community groups, but argued that despite the higher initial expense (over landfills), trash-to-steam was more profitable in the long run. Furthermore, they made sure to exceed all EPA standards, and ended up with sellable electricity.

Outfitted in hard-hats and earplugs, we were escorted to the Tipping Hall, a gargantuan and smelly place where the trash trucks unloaded their unpleasant contents into a dip pit. Five floors above, a single employee operated a giant claw which lowered to grab huge mounds of garbage, and then dropped it somewhere else, mixing up the contents as well as aerating them for better burning. "Dickensian," pronounced Nancy. We saw the furnaces, the water tanks and the pipes taking the steam to the anticlimactic generator. We were told that steam escaping the system should ALWAYS be white; any other color is reason for concern.

All in all, it was very educational and weird, i.e. an ideal Weeders adventure, and the next Conservation outing, completing the trash trilogy, will logically be a visit to a recycling site.

#### Garden Club of America

Jackie Burke and Marilyn Sprague were delegates, and Lloyd Brown was involved as a GCA Director, in the Zone V "North by Northwest" meeting on October 16th at the Huntington Valley Country Club. Jackie reported that the Weeders were successful in both the Photography and Flower Shows: in Photography, Alice Doering and Melissa Bullitt both won Ist, and Nancy Evans 2nd; Beth Bartle won a 1st in floral design. Alice also won the Rosie Jones Horticultural Award, and got a blue for her Syningia. Her

terrarium, with help from Cheryl, Diane, and Sally, won an Honorable Mention. There were 14 Clubs participating.
