Annual Report of the Admissions Committee

We learned that our Senators and Congresspeople really do care about seeing and hearing from us. We hope to encourage Weeders to become more proactive voters and citizens.

On April 20, the Conservation Committee met to discuss one more year with our focus, Lawn to Habitat. We hope from input from the Conservation Committee and all Weeders!

NAL Report for the Weeders

Weezie and I represented the Weeders at the NAL Conference. We were joined by roughly 300 other GCA members from all over the country. Our speaker at the opening dinner was Douglas Brinkley who spoke about his recent book, <u>Silent Spring Revolution</u>, the history of the environmental movement since Rachel Carson. For the next two days we heard a raft of compelling speakers. We had a senators and representatives from each side of the aisle, the Senior Advisor to the President on Clean Energy, the Under Secretary of Agriculture the CEOs of the Nature Conservancy, Earth Justice, Rachel's network, and Casey Trees and so many more.

On the third morning we met with GCA's Zone V members in our Senators offices before breaking into Congressional districts to meet our own Representatives. We spoke of the staff environmental issues of GCA's concern in which had been thoroughly educated by our speakers.

All were most interested in the Farm Bill which is coming before Congress shortly. We asked that they guard against any siphoning off funding for non-conservation and climate goals within the Farm Bill.

Many members of the Weeders Conservation Committee wrote Senator Toomey regarding Recovering America's Wildlife Act, RAWA In the last congress. The bill did not pass because

there was not a match for funding, but now there is, and the bill will be reintroduced in the House and Senate. It provides funding for conserving and restoring habitats, fighting invasive species, and reintroducing native plants. I hope all the Weeders will send emails at the appropriate time to push this over the finish line.

We asked our Senators and Representatives to support, The Break Free from Plastic Pollution Act and Save our Seas Act to address marine debris.

We also asked our Senators to support the Reinvesting in Shoreline Economies Act and Ecosystems and sign a federal resolution to declare February Native Plant Month.

We asked our Representatives to support the reintroduction of The Save Our Sequoias Act

In both houses we talked about the need for government to strengthen regulations and create legislation to protect our health and environment from Polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS).

We both felt we delivered important messages to our legislators, but we had fun too! We ate amazing meals with Zone V and other spectacular GCA members in wonderful venues. We learned so much!!! The Weeders send a delegate every year. This year there was room for Weezie and me. The Weeders and can provide a stipend for your expenses. If you are lucky enough for our president to ask you, say "YES"!!!!! It is an incredible experience that you will never forget!

Crazy for Containers Committee Report

Crazy for Containers! completed its 4th year in a truly spectacular way.

We sold 434 collections, baskets and bedding plants! We had 75 customers this year and for the first time, Friends of Weeders' orders outnumbered Weeders' orders! This was due in part to two innovations. We posted about CfC! on Facebook and Instagram. And we asked you to bring forms and your enthusiasm to your book clubs.

The result: a record \$17,000 in sales, and profit of \$7,642.

This was my last year as Chair of Crazy for Containers! I'm so grateful to all of my "crazies." I especially want to mention Cheryl Cheston, Jeanne May, Ellie Penniman, Laura Carpenter and Cindy Pierce. Each holds a vital role in our annual fundraiser and has exhibited tremendous skill and steadfast enthusiasm.

Finally, my thanks to Patty Greenhalgh and Jackie Burke who will become CfC!'s new co-chairs. I know Crazy for Containers! will continue to flourish in their capable hands.

- 6. I am continuing to work on developing ways for Weeders to use the website to communicate with each other, sign up for events, pay for dues, fundraisers and events.
- 7. I hope to recruit an assistant to help with new ways to use and update the site.
